Online safety



Children and young people spend a lot of time online – it can be a great way for them to socialise, explore and have fun. But children do also face risks like cyberbullying or seeing content that is inappropriate. Whether you're unsure about what happens online or are up to speed with new technology, it is important that you talk to your child about staying safe. It may feel daunting, but you don't need to be an expert on the internet. Understanding what children do online and the risks they face will help you keep your child safe online.

Ask your children if they're SMART when they're online. Use the SMART videos to make your children aware that although the internet is a powerful and amazing tool they need to be aware of their online profile and the information they share with the world.

'In a recent survey involving children aged between 9-16yrs old, almost half of Key Stage 2 children played games online and contacted people they did or did not know. 60% of Key Stage 2 children surveyed said they used a webcam or video app to chat their friends'. Whilst using these games online can be good for children, parental controls are also important for their safety.

Social Networking

Do you know the range of social networking websites/apps your children use? Are you aware of the age restrictions on each one and how they differ? Netware is a great website which not only explains the basics of each social media web-site but also gives guidance on what you need to know and why your children use it.

Free Wi-Fi



With so many organisations offering free public Wi-Fi and the widely differing requests for personal information it is important to consider the security of 'free' Wi-Fi. Many hotspots have little security (e.g. you don't need a password to sign in) which means your device could be open to hackers and your data easily shared with the public. Also, Wi-Fi hotspots offer very little filtering meaning that your child could be exposed to inappropriate material which is blocked at home.
